#### Dear Parents and Carers,

Well, we are counting down the next few days until the Christmas break. This last few days will be very busy and filled with much activity as we remember the birth of Jesus- the reason for the celebration. Sometimes the busy preparation and gift buying can

exclude the promised Messiah who came to us as a baby, the greatest gift ever! However you celebrate His birth, we hope you all have a joyful time.



This academic year is a very exciting one for us as it marks the 150<sup>th</sup> year of St Thomas' School in Heaton Chapel. Here is a short history of the school...

The first school was proposed in 1866 and its first academic year was 1867-68. It was to be built on a strip of land adjacent to the Church and given by Lord Egerton on the condition that it would revert to him (or to his heirs) should the land cease to be used for a school. The school was a wooden structure measuring built at a cost of £700.

By **1889** the school had to be enlarged. Lord Egerton offered a plot of land of three quarters of an acre at a rent of £15 per annum. This was some distance from the existing building, and it would appear that there was some disagreement with his Lordship over the conditions he wished to impose on the transaction. During the course of negotiations a tender of £2,530 from W Southern and Sons was accepted. The school was built of brick, was far larger and was much more substantial. At one point it is believed to have housed 300 pupils aged up to 15 years of age. All were accommodated on the ground floor in what is now the school hall. During a recent internal extension, evidence of partition doors and windows was uncovered. These allowed the school hall to be divided up into classrooms. There were fireplaces located at each end of the building.

In 1891, the committee decided to obtain land adjacent to the existing school, and a plot of some 1891 square yards was purchased from a Mr R Scott at a rental of £25 per year, which was still being paid in 1979. During the 1950s the graveyard to the west of St Thomas' Church was relocated to the churchyard and the surface tarmacked in order to increase the amount of playground space for the school. Very strict conditions were placed on its use!

<u>Sir John Alcock</u>, who with <u>Arthur Whitten Brown</u>, made the first non-stop transatlantic flight in 1919, was raised in Heaton Chapel and attended St. Thomas' Primary School.

Over the coming year, we are planning to host some events that help us celebrate the long life of our school, starting with our Victorian themed Year 6 Carol Service.



#### EXCITING TIMES FOR ST THOMAS' CE!

Our school has secured over €30,000 of Erasmus+ funding to run a Key Action 1 project for staff to enhance and develop their French skills and share best practice. Over the course of the next 2 years staff from St Thomas' will have the opportunity to spend a week in the south of France in order to improve their confidence and fluency in speaking French and to learn ways of introducing a more global element into their topic work and lessons. We will also set up a link with a school in Toulouse which will enhance pupils' and teachers' intercultural awareness and understanding and will offer real insight into children's lives in another country.

The teaching of a foreign language has been a statutory requirement in Key Stage 2 from September 2014. At St Thomas', we begin our French teaching in Year 2 to give the children access to a language at a particularly receptive age. The training which our staff will receive in France will greatly increase the opportunities for our pupils to use and apply French throughout the whole week, not just during their dedicated French lessons with Madame Taylor.

While in France staff will be keeping in touch by updates on the school website and a Twitter feed **@ErasmusStThomas** The first staff to go to France were Madame Taylor and Mr (or Monsieur!) Campen who spent a week in a French school in November.

#### Keeping your children safe.

I am sure we all agree that we want our children to arrive at school safely each day and return home in the same way. There have been a growing number of cases where our Junior children are walking wholly or partially to and from school unsupervised. Groups of our children have also been congregating in the area around the railway line. This causes us some concern. It has always been our policy that only Year 6 children should come to school and go home independently and that parents in Year 6 inform school if this is their arrangement. This year group may have mobile phones for this reason and these are held for safekeeping at school during the day.
