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Reception

In Reception we have been learning all about 'People Who Help Us'. We have been lucky enough to have visitors from our school community to come in and talk to us all about their jobs and how they help people. So far we have been visited by:

A Soldier

We had a parent in our community come and tell us all about his role in the army. We learnt that being in the army is all about helping people and keeping peace. We learnt about the different roles in the army, such as chefs, helicopter pilots, doctors & nurses and soldiers. We even got to act out some of the roles!

<u>A Nurse</u>

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We also had another parent come in and tell us all about her job as an A&E nurse. Her roles was all about helping people when they are hurt. She showed us all of the fantastic equipment that nurses and doctors use to help people to feel better. We loved using some of the bandages within our continuous provision.







<u>A GP</u>

One of the parents in our community is a GP. He came in to tell us all about the many people that he helps to feel better every day. He showed us some of the equipment that he uses to check over his patients. He even let us have a go at using them!





<u>Year 1</u>

In Year 1, we have been exploring fireworks and the Gunpowder Plot. We talked about our experiences of fire work displays and created art work showing fireworks.







We then wrote an acrostic poem using lots of adjectives. We wrote the first part together and then we each wrote our own part.



In history we learnt all about the Gunpowder plot. We became experts and wrote a recount of the events.



<u>Year 2</u>

In English we've been writing instructions for lots of different things. We wanted to decorate our classrooms and so we thought about how we could link the two together. We decided to write instructions for paper snowflakes and angels. We then created them. These snowflakes have decorated our classrooms so beautifully!

We also added a little glitter to give our classrooms a bit of Christmas sparkle.



In RE we have been learning about the nativity story. We've been trying to think about how the characters in the story would be feeling at that magical time. We formed the choir in the nativity and had a fabulous time celebrating the Christmas Story.

<u>Year 3</u>

Year 3 have been looking at 'Rocks and Soils' this half term.

We used a bowl of jelly to imagine what the layers of rock look like beneath our feet. The layers of jelly represent the different layers of rock. The sweets show how fossils get trapped in the rock and are pushed down by the weight of the layers above over time.

We also created fossils using plasticine to represent the land and water and we had great fun learning about the fossilisation process.





We planned an experiment to find out which rocks are impermeable, durable and if any float in water. We also went on to discover how soil comes from broken-down rocks and spent time observing and sieving different types of soils.





<u>Year 4</u>

A big thank you to all of our Year 4 children for conducting the Christmas Service - entitled 'One Bright Star'. Despite being saddened that our parent community could not join us, we still celebrated Jesus' birth altogether.

With super solo singers, amazing actors, marvellous narrators and a rousing choir, we raised the roof with our celebrations.

<u>Year 5</u>

Dementia Friendly Carol Concert

On Friday 10th December, a group of children from Year 5 walked over to Heaton Moor's Dementia Friendly group Christmas party to sing Christmas songs and carols to them. It was a poignant moment to see the folk there so full of joy and excitement as they joined in with us – the '12 Days of Christmas' was a particular hit and became quite rowdy at one point! We are completing the Archbishop of York's Young Leaders Award this year, and as part of this the children are completing acts of service within our local community. Our choir also visited The Heatons School to share our wonderful singing



Geography / Design Technology

We have enjoyed learning about South America in Geography this term, and as part of this we made comparisons between life in the favelas of Brazil to life in Stockport. We linked this to Design Technology by designing, making and evaluating our own 3D favelas in the style of Haus and Hahn. We are very pleased with how they turned out!





<u>Music</u>

In Music, we composed and performed an Amazon-themed collaborative class piece of music. We built up a soundscape of the rainforest, selecting certain instruments to represent different sounds e.g. rain, animal sounds etc... We then pieced together a story of a jaguar attacking a caiman, using volume, tempo, texture and dynamics to

tell the story through the music. We were able to perform these to our buddy classes in Year 3. (As part of Friendship Week in November, we buddied together with another class to help develop friendships and to build in mentoring opportunities across year groups.)

<u>Year 6</u>

History/ English- World War One

This half term, year six have continued to learn about WW1. We have completed our class text 'Private Peaceful' as well as exploring WW1 poetry. The children created their own anthology of poetry. Remembrance Day was all the more poignant this year, as the children now have a more in-depth understanding of the horrors faced by soldiers. They created poppy plaques in honour of the fallen.







Science/ Geography

Christmas dinners around the world offer quite the variety! Did you know, for example, that the traditional dish of choice in Japan is fried chicken (provided by a rather famous Colonel!) Children have been researching Christmas food traditions across the globe, calculating the nutritional value and making decisions as to who makes the

healthiest choices. Following this, children located each country on a map of the world and looked for trends or similarities within regions and continents.
