Piñatas

Piñatas are sweet and toy filled containers often made of papier-mâché, pottery, or cloth which are broken as part of a celebration. The traditional shape of the piñata is the six-pointed star; although today, any shape is used eg. animals, plants, flowers etc. The clay pot or 'olla de barro', that goes inside contains the sweets or small toys. At a fiesta (celebration), the piñata suspends from above while blindfolded children try hitting it with a stick. Around the piñata the children sing:

Dale, dale, dale, No perdas el tino, Porque so lo perdes, pierdes el camino.

Hit it, hit it, don't lose your aim. 'Cause if you lose it, you'll lose your way!

La Gallinita Ciega - The Blind Hen

A popular Mexican game with children in Mexico. It is like blind man's bluff. To play this game, you need 2-3 people (only people in your bubble or family).



Begin by choosing the person who will be "la gallinita ciega", blindfold them so that they cannot see. Turn the little hen (blindfolded person) round 5 times. They must find and tag each player while blindfolded. The other players may move around and use their voices to hint at their location, perhaps squawking like a chicken? You are out when the hen tags you, the game continues until all the players have been caught. Be careful of furniture... be kind as you play - and have fun.
